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**11 INDIANA HIGH SCHOOLS JOIN NOTRE DAME PROGRAM SUPPORTING
COLLEGE AND CAREER READINESS IN STEM FIELDS**

AP-TIP IN Enters 6th Year: Students and Teachers Gain from STEM College Readiness

SOUTH BEND, IN – February 7, 2018 – Indiana’s Advanced Placement Teacher Investment Program (AP-TIP IN) is pleased to announce its sixth cohort, which includes 11 Indiana public high schools. These schools have been invited to implement AP-TIP IN’s model for increasing enrollment and achievement in math, science and English Advanced Placement courses, which prepare students for success in college and careers. These schools will participate in AP-TIP IN’s program of teacher training and support for teachers and students during the 2018-19 and 2019-20 school years.

Joining the eight schools that comprise Cohort 5, these schools announced today are projected to increase the number of students, including students from underrepresented populations, participating in AP math, science and English courses, as well as increase the number of qualifying scores (3, 4, or 5 on an AP exam that earns college credit). Students can earn college credit in high schools as they prepare for tomorrow’s economy driven by science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) skills.
